### **FROM FATHER DREW**

Acts 8.1.8 Wednesday of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Week of Easter

There broke out a severe persecution of the Church in Jerusalem.

The persecution started after the Deacon Stephen was stoned to death. Stephen, though he wasn't very nice about it, gave his fellow countrymen the truth about Christ. The Jewish leaders did not particularly care to hear the truth, and so they killed Stephen and then went looking for his associates.

The disciples then scattered to the countryside, but the Apostles remained in Jerusalem. It took courage to do both. You see, living in exile is hardly a comfortable situation. Nor is living in close proximity with people who want to kill you.

Saul, the future St Paul, who assisted in Stephen's storing, would have been one of those people wanting to see Christians die. Luke wrote how Saul was trying to destroy the Church. In government-run-amok, secret police fashion, featuring spying and paid informers, Saul kicked in the doors of homes and dragged men and women off to jail.

And what was their crime? Were they hoarding weapons and planning to overthrow the Jewish leadership? Were they guilty of racism as they claimed to be the new chosen people? No, their crime was spreading what those who today control the means of communication call "disinformation" about Jesus the Nazorean. They also claimed Christ was the fulfillment of the Jewish scriptures and prophets. And worst of all they believed He was God.

Saul, the most zealous of Pharisees, had to be left scratching his head. The more he pursued, tortured, imprisoned and did away with Christians, the more the movement grew. This of course was a part of God's plan. In very short order the scattered disciples would take the Good News to the whole world.

This is the paradox of Christianity that the spirit of the world will never grasp. Give Christianity what appears to be a mortal blow, and it lives. It spreads, because it cannot be killed. The Church is the Body of Christ, the head of which is Christ. And Christ lives forever. So, too then does his Body. What comes from God cannot be destroyed. (continued on back)

St Pope Leo the Great wrote: *The religion founded by the mystery of the cross of Christ cannot be destroyed by any form of cruelty. The Church is not diminished by persecutions; on the contrary, they make for its increase. The field of the Lord is clothed in a richer harvest. When the grain which falls dies, it is reborn and multiplied* (Homily on Peter and Paul).

And so, there is the reason for our hope; for our joy and optimism amidst a world darkened by so much sin. Thank you, St Paul, for kicking in doors and persecuting followers of "the Way" who became known as Christians! That prompted disciples to scatter, to leave Jerusalem and take the message to the world. That is how we know about it! That is how we have come to know the truth – that Jesus Christ suffered for our sins, and then rose from the dead for our hope. And that is why we love our enemies. And pray for those who persecute us.

I am starting to react to my environment and although I can already feel sensations like pain I really hope things stay the same—quiet, peaceful, and warm.
